\$135 for non 4-H members

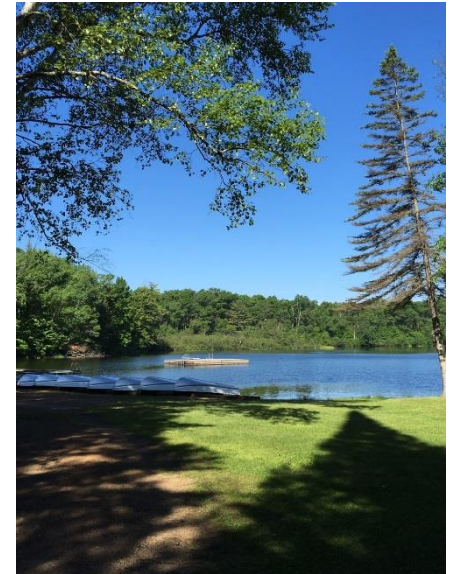
Camp fees cover lodging, meals, snacks, crafts, camp T-shirt, transportation, other activities, and insurance.

Refund Policy: A complete refund, except for the \$10 deposit, will be made to you if you cancel more than seven days prior to the first day of camp. No refund is given after this time except for prorated refunds in case of major illness, accident, or death in the family.

Bus Transportation: Buses leave the Brussels area about 8:00 am on Wednesday, and return about 5:00 pm on Saturday. More detailed information is mailed prior to camp.

Arrival/Departure: If campers will not be utilizing the transportation provided, they should arrive at camp between 10:00-10:30 am on the first day and be picked up promptly at 3:00 pm on the last day of camp.

4-H Camp is for any youth 3rd-6th grade, as of the 2016-2017 school year. Youth do not need to be a 4-H member to participate.

4-H Camp is about providing youth a chance to make new friends and belong to a group, explore new skills and interests, and build responsibility and independence.

This camp is operated by the Northeast Wisconsin Youth Camp Team made up of UW-Extension 4-H Youth Development professionals from five counties in Northeastern Wisconsin.

At summer camp you will enjoy a variety of fun camp activities planned by camp youth and adult staff:

Arts and Crafts: You will explore your creative abilities to make things and express yourself.

Recreation: You will have opportunities to get involved with other campers in large group games and sports, which may include running and personal contact with other participants.

Waterfront: You will be able to go swimming, boating, and canoeing in Sand Lake. There is a required swim test given at camp before campers can go into deep water. Lifeguards are present during all waterfront activities.

Nature: You will have opportunities to explore the many natural wonders in and around camp such as the lake, nature trails, streams, animal tracks, birds, and trees.

Campfires: As a camper, you will be able to celebrate with music, skits, storytelling, and entertainment.

All areas of camp will offer a variety of activities including skits, scavenger hunts, eco-exploring, and possibly archery.

In some group activities, it may be necessary of a volunteer to position a child for proper stance or effectiveness, but only with the child's permission.



Camp Bird consists of five cabins in each of its four units. There are beds for up to eight to nine campers and one to two youth staff to stay in each cabin. Enrolled 4-H adult volunteers stay in a separate cabin nearby. A bath house, with individual showers and bathroom facilities, is conveniently located near each cabin unit.

A large dining hall with a modern kitchen is at the center of the grounds. All campers are served plentiful, nutritious, family style meals. A large recreation hall, craft building, and nature building are available for inclement weather.



A health coordinator who is trained in first aid and CPR is on duty at all times to handle minor health and safety needs. The coordinator can only administer medications sent with the camper and as directed on the Youth Event Health form. The Crivitz Rescue Squad is ready to handle any emergencies. Campers are covered by accident insurance.

The camp is overseen by UW-Extension staff. The camp staff consists of adult paid staff plus adult volunteers who serve as chaperones, role models, and activity directors each session of camp. All of the adult volunteers are enrolled 4-H volunteers and have completed the youth protection process. We have a maximum ratio of ten youth to every one adult. Campers will be spending the majority of their time under the direct supervision of youth volunteer staff (counselors, junior counselors, and assistant program leaders). All youth staff, ranging from age 14-19, have participated in a minimum of eight hours of training. Our ratio of campers to youth staff is seven to one.
